light wire hook straightens when pressure is applied

and is easily bent back into shape after being retrieved. However, the hook is strong enough to hold a fish without straightening so crappie anglers have the best of two worlds- the hook is easily removed from limbs, etc. and the



thin wire penetrates the mouth of the fish quickly.

Light line, a Slider crappie lure and a Double Light Wire Crappie Slider is always a recipe for putting slab crappie in the frying pan.

#### Suspending Bass PART TWO

"IN HIS OWN WORDS" - The Late CHARLIE BREWER, SR.

When I started fishing lakes I would fish according to the graph recorder. Seldom did I catch fish any deeper than the graph showed

This proves that fish do suspend and we should fish accordingly.

A small, 200 acre lake in Tennessee was a flat land-type lake and the fishing was done on the hot, bright days of July and August.

Over a period of one month, my buddy and I fished this lake several afternoons. By actual count, we landed 323 bass averaging about 46 bass per afternoon. These were head counts and they ran from very small up to about six lbs. each.

Many of them were nice 3 pounders and super fun on our light tackle.

On every afternoon we visited the lake we observed the bass to be suspended no more than four or five feet deep according to our graph recorder and/or oxygen meter. Four or five feet was the exact depth we caught the fish. We were using the Slider rig.

The Slider head was trimmed down so we could apply the slow, steady "do nothing" retrieve. At those shallow depths we tried to slide our lure through the water no deeper than four or five feet deep. As a result, we were in action fast and furious. Nearly all of the fish were taken way offshore of the small lake.
