


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## Slider Lures sponsor youth club

### TIPS: Chasing Crappie "IN HIS OWN WORDS" By the late CHARLIE BREWER, SR.

Crappie are very depth conscious. They school, or bunch-up, and may suspend at the same depth. And, of course, they will always (or nearly always) suspend or relate to structure.

Crappie may all suspend 24 or 6 feet deep-always relating to structure for a given time during the spawn. Sometimes the bigger crappie may suspend a little deeper on the same structure. Control of your lure at the proper depth is very important.

Crappie appear to be lazy and sometimes won't go a foot out of their way to catch food. As a result, you've got to deliver the lure right to their bread basket.

They also appear to be greedy rascals and will gobble up food (your lure) about as fast as you can present it to them. At times, they seem to eat and eat and never get filled-up. This is why great numbers of them can be caught, especially during the spring spawning season.

The two most popular jiggging techniques are the slow, steady retrieve, and the slow "pull and drop" method. The slow, steady retrieve is simply casting the lure and very slowly retrieving it. Try to keep the lure under a straight and tight line. By doing this you can feel the faint strike of a crappie much easier.
